INTRODUCTION (for the student)

This book is designed to ease your transition in to reading the Tenor C Clef.

Treat the process as if you are learning a new language; start slowly and build a "bank" of notes that you are comfortable reading and gradually extend your notation range.

It is important to read the Clef, not to do transpositions from other Clefs or think in terms of chopping off Stave lines- in the long term you will be grateful that you can read the clef properly and are sure of the notes you are playing!

To start with, try to say the note names in your head as you play. This will slow down your playing but in the early stages will help to reinforce the link between notation, slide position/ fingering and pitch. Don't be in such a hurry to play the piece that you resort to playing "by ear". The point of this process is to become adept at playing in the Tenor C Clef, not to be able to play a simple tune by ear. The first few pieces have the tune written in the Bass Clef first to give you a reference point.

Do the written exercises first and try to think in terms of the Key you are playing in as well as the Tonic Triad; you will never be more than one note away from a Tonic Triad note so it's worth having these "logged into your brain" before you start playing a piece.

When you get to the stage of changing Clef during a piece it is important to be careful of pitching. We are used to the higher notes on the Stave sounding at a higher pitch than the lower notes but changing Clef disturbs the visual - versus - pitch association.

"WHAT'S THE POINT OF THE TENOR CLEF?"

....a frequently asked question!

The point is that you can not avoid it. From this stage of your playing you will come across the Tenor C Clef in solo pieces, ensemble pieces and Grade exam Sight-Reading tests.

It may seem difficult to believe now, but soon you will see the Tenor C Clef as a good thing as it avoids having to read lots of Leger lines as your range increases.
